

In 2024 we celebrate the 30th anniversary of the first Brighton Education Fund (BEF) grants to the school district:

- Over 440 grants awarded to date totaling \$600,000 Grants have supported every grade and every academic area
- Grants addressed a wide range of purposes, each one in response to staff
- Every grant is intended to enrich the learning opportunities for Brighton's student

The Fund provides teachers with a unique resource to explore new ideas beyond the reach of a given year's budget, often piloting projects that will become a permanent part of the district's program. Requests may come from one or more teachers for the purpose of serving a single class, a cluster, even a grade level or an entire school. This report will present a cross-section of the funded grants, which have ranged from a few hundred dollars to over \$5,000. The dollar amounts might seem small compared to the district's budget, but every grant represents an important idea.

All this has been possible because of support from the Brighton community - parents, alumni, staff members who value the special quality of enthusiasm for learning that characterizes the Brighton school district.

Funds are dispersed from an endowment that has been built over the years as well as from recent donations. In addition to the endowment, several named funds created in memory of staff members and graduates support designated areas of interest.

Special collections at TCMS

BOOKS ARE A SPECIAL CATEGORY

Over 30 years BEF has purchased 1000s of books, over 2000 in the last decade alone. Each collection was requested by district staff to address specific topics and needs for K-12 students and to make the work of visiting authors widely available.

The Council Rock and French Road libraries have used BEF grants for collections of children's literature focused on the social and emotional issues that can impact young students. Literature is used by the schools' counseling staffs to facilitate conversations with students around topics that are often difficult for children to discuss.

BEF enabled the piloting of Council Rock's summer bookbags - a carefully selected collection of books for students with reading challenges to take home for the summer and return in the fall. That program is now included in the building budget.

Many varied special collections have gone to the middle school, among them an updated collection on New York state history, foreign language books so that students from other nations can maintain their native language skills while they are learning English, and a large collection of leveled texts (books with similar content but different reading skills) that align with the curriculum.

The high school English department received a substantial collection of novels from other cultures and nations, broadening the literature selections available to the students. Finally, BEF supported the establishment of the alumni book collection, which has grown to include 244 books by Brighton graduates.

SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY

Over 240 grants have supported science and technology, enabling all sorts of new possibilities.

Science teacher George Smith wrote: "The BEF has provided critical support for materials not ordinarily covered by the BCSD/Science Department budget, but more importantly BEF funding has provided seed money for new projects/new ideas that need to be tested - and may or may not ultimately work out. Two strengths of the BEF's approach are: 1. the BEF's emphasis on funding hands-on materials that will be used by as many students as possible, and 2. providing funding for materials for piloting concepts that may later be adopted by BCSD and incorporated into the curriculum."

VISUAL & PERFORMING ARTS

Over 100 grants have supported the visual and performing arts. From bringing in visiting artists and musicians (the Ying Quartet, Mitzi Collins, The Moxie Strings, and others), to field trips to plays (GEVA, Broadway) and museums, to purchasing hardware and software to enable digital media productions, arts grants have introduced Brighton's students to an amazing array of experiences. Exposure to such a variety of new ideas and creative ideas has greatly enriched and benefited Brighton's students.

THE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Rows of desks are not suited for all purposes in a school. BEF grants have supported the creation of special environments to help students learn.

Soft furniture, lamplight, and rugs instead of hard floor can make for more relaxing spaces. BEF has provided such furnishings to create a cozy reading area in the TCMS library, a comfortable discussion space for the BHS Guidance Department, and less formal decor for the INSPIRE and PATH programs.

BEF contributed to the district's explorations of alternative classroom furnishings with standing desks and softer seating. In other spaces, free-standing white boards were provided for students to use for group problem solving.

Hands-on manipulatives in the form of creative materials and board games have been requested as an alternative to electronics for activities at CR, FRES, and TCMS.

So Many Different Kinds of Requests!

Some grants are for one-time events, some become permanent parts of the district program, some introduce an idea that will then be developed in another way, but all grants are an opportunity to try something that will make a positive difference for Brighton's students.



10 Virtual Reality headsets designed to connect to most smartphones, allowed counselors and students to "visit" college campuses despite COVID-19 travel restrictions, and they remain useful.

In the TCMS multidisciplinary Empty Bowls project, students learned about hunger in Social Studies, nutrition in Health class, cooking rice dishes in Home and





Careers, and making rice bowls in Art. BEF provided all the materials and ingredients, and the students sold their rice bowls as in fundraisers for the Brighton Food Cupboard.

Many grants have addressed understanding emotions and developing critical thinking skills. In Health class at FRES, small groups of students use puppets to represent the fight, flight, and freeze reactions in the brain - how this happens, why this happens, and how to respond to these feelings.
